# On the Krall-type polynomials on q-quadratic lattices

#### Abstract

In this paper, we study the Krall-type polynomials on non-uniform lattices. For these polynomials the second order linear difference equation, $q$-basic series representation and three-term recurrence relations are obtained. In particular, the $q$-Racah-Krall polynomials obtained via the addition of two mass points to the weight function of the non-standard $q$-Racah polynomials at the ends of the interval of orthogonality are considered in detail. Some important limit cases are also discussed.


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## 1. Introduction

The Krall-type polynomials are polynomials which are orthogonal with respect to a linear functional $\widetilde{\mathfrak{u}}$ obtained from a quasi-definite functional $\mathfrak{u}: \mathbb{P} \mapsto \mathbb{C}(\mathbb{P}$, denotes the space of complex polynomials with complex coefficients) via the addition of delta Dirac measures, i.e., $\widetilde{\mathfrak{u}}$ is the linear functional

[^0]where $A_{k} \in \mathbb{R}, x_{1}, \ldots, x_{k} \in \mathbb{R}$ and $\delta_{a}$ is the delta Dirac functional at the point $a$, i.e., $\left\langle\delta_{a}, p\right\rangle=p(a)$, where $p \in \mathbb{P}$.

These kind of polynomials appear as eigenfunctions of a fourth order linear differential operator with polynomial coefficients that do not depend on the degree of the polynomials. They were firstly considered by Krall in [27] (for a more recent reviews see [8] and [26, chapter XV]). In fact, H. L. Krall discovered that there are only three extra families of orthogonal polynomials apart from the classical polynomials of Hermite, Laguerre and Jacobi that satisfy such a fourth order differential equation which are orthogonal with respect to measures that are not absolutely continuous with respect to the Lebesgue measure. Namely, the Jacobi-type polynomials that are orthogonal with respect to the weight function $\rho(x)=(1-x)^{\alpha}+M \delta(x), M>0, \alpha>-1$ supported on $[0,1]$, the Legendre-type polynomials orthogonal on $[-1,1]$ with respect to $\rho(x)=\alpha / 2+\delta(x-1) / 2+\delta(x+1) / 2, \alpha>0$, and the Laguerre-type polynomials that are orthogonal with respect to $\rho(x) e^{-x}+M \delta(x), M>0$ on $[0, \infty)$. This result motivated the study of the polynomials orthogonal with respect to the more general weight functions [23, 25] that could contain more instances of orthogonal polynomials being eigenfunctions of higherorder differential equations (see also [26, chapters XVI, XVII]).

In the last years the study of such polynomials have attracted an increasing interest (see e.g. $[4,8,19,28]$ and the references therein) with a special emphasis on the case when the starting functional $\mathfrak{u}$ is a classical continuous linear functional (this case leads to the Jacobi-Krall, LaguerreKrall, Hermite-Krall, and Bessel-Krall polynomials, see e.g. [7, 13, 14, 18, 23, 25]) or a classical discrete one (this leads to the Hahn-Krall, MeixnerKrall, Kravchuk-Krall, and Charlier-Krall polynomials, see e.g. [6, 7, 15]). Moreover, in [4] a general theory was developed for modifications of quasidefinite linear functionals that covers all the continuous cases mentioned above whereas in [9] the case when $\mathfrak{u}$ is a discrete semiclassical or $q$-semiclassical linear functional was considered in detail. But in [9] (see also [5]) only the linear type lattices (for a discussion on the linear type lattices see [3]) were considered. Here we go further and study the Krall-type polynomials obtained by adding delta Dirac functionals to the discrete functionals $\mathfrak{u}$ defined on the $q$-quadratic lattice $x(s)=c_{1} q^{s}+c_{2} q^{-s}+c_{3}$.

Notice that since this lattice is not linear, the general results of [9] may not be applied in general, and therefore an appropriate method must be developed. In fact, the main aim of the present paper is to show that the method presented in [9] can be adapted for the more general lattice. For
the sake of simplicity we focus on the case when the starting functional $\mathfrak{u}$ is a $q$-classical family on the $q$-quadratic lattice $x(s)=c_{1} q^{s}+c_{2} q^{-s}+$ $c_{3}$. In particular, we study the modifications of the non-standard $q$-Racah polynomials defined on the lattice $x(s)=[s]_{q}[s+1]_{q}$,

[s]_{q}=\frac{q^{s / 2}-q^{-s / 2}}{q^{1 / 2}-q^{-1 / 2}}, \quad s \in \mathbb{C},
$$

which were introduced in [29] and studied in detail in [2, 10]. Also, in section 4.2 we discuss some important limit cases of $q$-Racah, namely, the dual $q$ Hahn polynomials on the lattice $x(s)=[s]_{q}[s+1]_{q}$, the non-standard Racah polynomials on the lattice $x(s)=s(s+1)$ [29, page 108], and the $q$-Hahn polynomials on the lattice $x(s)=q^{-s}$ [24, page 445].

The structure of the paper is as follows. In Section 2, some preliminary results are presented as well as the representations for the kernels on the general lattice $x(s)=c_{1} q^{s}+c_{2} q^{-s}+c_{3}$. In section 3, the general theory of the $q$-Krall polynomials on the general lattice is developed, and finally, in section 4 , some concrete examples are considered.

## 2. Preliminary results

Here we include some results from the theory of classical polynomials on the general ( $q$-quadratic) lattice (for further details and notations see e.g. [2, 29])

The orthogonal polynomials on non-uniform lattices $P_{n}(s)_{q}:=P_{n}(x(s))$ are the polynomial solutions of the second order linear difference equation (SODE) of hypergeometric type

\Delta y(s)=y(s+1)-y(s), \quad \nabla y(s)=y(s)-y(s-1)
\end{gathered}
$$

or, equivalently

& A_{s} y(s+1)+B_{s} y(s)+C_{s} y(s-1)+\lambda_{n} y(s)=0 \\
& A_{s}=\frac{\sigma(s)+\tau(s) \Delta x\left(s-\frac{1}{2}\right)}{\Delta x(s) \Delta x\left(s-\frac{1}{2}\right)}, \quad C_{s}=\frac{\sigma(s)}{\nabla x(s) \Delta x\left(s-\frac{1}{2}\right)}, \quad B_{s}=-A_{s}-B_{s} \tag{2}

where $\sigma(s)$ and $\tau(s)$ are polynomials of degree at most 2 and exactly 1 , respectively, and $\lambda_{n}$ is a constant, that are orthogonal with respect to the linear functional $\mathfrak{u}: \mathbb{P}_{q} \mapsto \mathbb{C}$, where $\mathbb{P}_{q}$ denotes the space of polynomials on the lattice (1) (compare with [29, Eq. (3.3.4) page 71])

In the above formula $\rho$ is the weight function and $d_{n}^{2}:=\left\langle\mathfrak{u}, P_{n}^{2}\right\rangle$.
Since the polynomials $P_{n}(s)_{q}$ are orthogonal with respect to a linear functional, they satisfy a three-term recurrence relation (TTRR) $[2,16]$

x(s) P_{n}(s)_{q}=\alpha_{n} P_{n+1}(s)_{q}+\beta_{n} P_{n}(s)_{q}+\gamma_{n} P_{n-1}(s)_{q}, \quad n=0,1,2, \ldots, \tag{4}
\end{equation*}

with the initial conditions $P_{0}(s)_{q}=1, P_{-1}(s)_{q}=0$, and also the differentiation formulas [2, Eqs. (5.65) and (5.67)] (or [11, Eqs. (24) and (25)]

where $\Phi(s)=\sigma(s)+\tau(s) \Delta x\left(s-\frac{1}{2}\right)$, and

\bar{\alpha}_{n}=\widehat{\alpha}_{n}=-\frac{\alpha_{n} \lambda_{2 n}}{[2 n]_{q}}, \quad \bar{\beta}_{n}(s)=\frac{\lambda_{n}}{[n]_{q}} \frac{\tau_{n}(s)}{\tau_{n}^{\prime}}, \quad \widehat{\beta}_{n}(s)=\bar{\beta}_{n}(s)-\lambda_{n} \Delta x\left(s-\frac{1}{2}\right) .

Notice that from (6) and the TTRR (4) it follows that

where

\Theta(s, n)=\frac{\alpha_{n}}{\widehat{\alpha}_{n} \gamma_{n}}\left[\frac{\Phi(s)}{\Delta x(s)}-\frac{\lambda_{2 n}}{[2 n]_{q}}\left(x(s)-\beta_{n}\right)+\widehat{\beta}_{n}(s)\right], \Xi(s, n)=-\frac{\alpha_{n}}{\widehat{\alpha}_{n} \gamma_{n}} \frac{\Phi(s)}{\Delta x(s)} .

From the TTRR (4) the Christoffel-Darboux formula for the $n$-th reproducing kernel follows (see [16, 29])

\mathrm{K}_{n}\left(s_{1}, s_{2}\right):=\sum_{k=0}^{n} \frac{P_{k}\left(s_{1}\right)_{q} P_{k}\left(s_{2}\right)_{q}}{d_{k}^{2}}=\frac{\alpha_{n}}{d_{n}^{2}} \frac{P_{n+1}\left(s_{1}\right)_{q} P_{n}\left(s_{2}\right)_{q}-P_{n+1}\left(s_{2}\right)_{q} P_{n}\left(s_{1}\right)_{q}}{x\left(s_{1}\right)-x\left(s_{2}\right)} . \tag{8}
\end{equation*}

Let us obtain an explicit representation of the kernels for the special values when $\sigma\left(s_{0}\right)=0$ and $\Phi\left(s_{0}\right)=0$, respectively.

1. The case $\sigma\left(s_{0}\right)=0$. Using (5) to eliminate $P_{n+1}$ in (8) yields

\mathrm{K}_{n}\left(s, s_{0}\right)=\frac{\alpha_{n} P_{n}\left(s_{0}\right)_{q}}{\bar{\alpha}_{n} d_{n}^{2}}\left\{\frac{\bar{\beta}_{n}\left(s_{0}\right)-\bar{\beta}_{n}(s)}{x(s)-x\left(s_{0}\right)} P_{n}(s)_{q}+\frac{\sigma(s)}{x(s)-x\left(s_{0}\right)} \frac{\nabla P_{n}(s)_{q}}{\nabla x(s)}\right\} . \tag{9}
\end{equation*}

2. The case $\Phi\left(s_{0}\right)=0$. In an analogous way, but now using (6) we obtain

\mathrm{K}_{n}\left(s, s_{0}\right)=\frac{\alpha_{n} P_{n}\left(s_{0}\right)_{q}}{\widehat{\alpha}_{n} d_{n}^{2}}\left\{\frac{\widehat{\beta}_{n}\left(s_{0}\right)-\widehat{\beta}_{n}(s)}{x(s)-x\left(s_{0}\right)} P_{n}(s)_{q}+\frac{\Phi(s)}{x(s)-x\left(s_{0}\right)} \frac{\Delta P_{n}(s)_{q}}{\Delta x(s)}\right\} . \tag{10}
\end{equation*}

## 3. Representation formula and some of their consequences

To obtain the general representation formula for the polynomials orthogonal with respect to the perturbed functional $\mathfrak{u}: \mathbb{P}_{q} \mapsto \mathbb{C}, \widetilde{\mathfrak{u}}=\mathfrak{u}+$ $\sum_{k=1}^{M} A_{k} \delta_{x\left(a_{k}\right)}$, i.e.,

\langle\widetilde{\mathfrak{u}}, P\rangle=\langle\mathfrak{u}, P\rangle+\sum_{k=1}^{M} A_{k} P\left(a_{k}\right)_{q}, \tag{11}
\end{equation*}

we can use the ideas of $[9, \S 2.1]$.
Let $\widetilde{P}_{n}(s)_{q}$ be the polynomials orthogonal with respect to $\widetilde{\mathfrak{u}}$ and $P_{n}(s)_{q}$ the polynomials orthogonal with respect to $\mathfrak{u}$. We assume that $\widetilde{\mathfrak{u}}$ is quasi-definite and therefore there exists a sequence of monic polynomials $\left(\widetilde{P}_{n}\right)_{n}$ orthogonal with respect to $\widetilde{\mathfrak{u}}$. Thus we can consider the Fourier expansion

Then, for $0 \leq k \leq n-1$,

\lambda_{n, k}=\frac{\left\langle\mathfrak{u}, \widetilde{P}_{n}(s)_{q} P_{k}(s)_{q}\right\rangle}{\left\langle\mathfrak{u}, P_{k}^{2}(s)_{q}\right\rangle}=-\sum_{i=1}^{M} A_{i} \widetilde{P}_{n}\left(a_{i}\right) \frac{P_{k}\left(a_{i}\right)_{q}}{\left\langle\mathfrak{u}, P_{k}^{2}(s)_{q}\right\rangle},
$$

and the following representation formulas hold [30] (see also [22, §2.9])

\widetilde{P}_{n}(s)_{q}=P_{n}(s)_{q}-\sum_{i=1}^{M} A_{i} \widetilde{P}_{n}\left(a_{i}\right)_{q} \mathrm{~K}_{n-1}\left(s, a_{i}\right) \tag{13}
\end{equation*}

where $\mathrm{K}_{n}(x, y)$ is given by (8). In the following we denote by $d_{n}^{2}$ the quantity $d_{n}^{2}=\left\langle\mathfrak{u}, P_{n}^{2}(s)_{q}\right\rangle$, i.e., the squared norm of the polynomials $P_{n}(s)_{q}$ whereas $\widetilde{d}_{n}^{2}$ denotes the value $\widetilde{d_{n}^{2}}=\left\langle\widetilde{\mathfrak{u}}, \widetilde{P}_{n}^{2}(s)_{q}\right\rangle$. Furthermore,

\widetilde{d}_{n}^{2}:=\left\langle\widetilde{\mathfrak{u}}, \widetilde{P}_{n}^{2}(s)_{q}\right\rangle=d_{n}^{2}+\sum_{i=1}^{M} A_{i} \widetilde{P}_{n}\left(a_{i}\right)_{q} P_{n}\left(a_{i}\right)_{q} \tag{14}
\end{equation*}

We assume that the leading coefficients of $\widetilde{P}_{n}(s)_{q}$ and $P_{n}(s)_{q}$ are the same, and for the sake of simplicity we consider monic polynomials, i.e., $P_{n}(s)_{q}=$ $x^{n}(s)+b_{n} x^{n-1}(s)+\cdots$, and $\widetilde{P}_{n}(s)_{q}=x^{n}(s)+\widetilde{b}_{n} x^{n-1}(s)+\cdots$. Then, from (12) it follows that

\widetilde{b}_{n}=b_{n}+\lambda_{n, n-1}=b_{n}-\frac{1}{d_{n-1}^{2}} \sum_{i=1}^{M} A_{i} \widetilde{P}_{n}\left(a_{i}\right)_{q} P_{n-1}\left(a_{i}\right)_{q} \tag{15}
\end{equation*}

Evaluating (13) at the points $a_{k}, k=1,2, \ldots, M$, we obtain the following system of $M$ linear equations in the $M$ unknowns $\left(\widetilde{P}_{n}\left(a_{k}\right)\right)_{k=1}^{M}$

\end{equation*}

Therefore, in order to assure the existence and uniqueness of the solution of the above linear system (16) (and then, the existence of the system of orthogonal polynomials $\left.\left(\widetilde{P}_{n}\right)_{n}\right)$ the matrix of the system (16) should be nonsingular, which is stated in the following proposition.

Proposition 1. The linear functional $\widetilde{\mathfrak{u}}$ defined in (11) is a quasi-definite linear functional if and only if the matrix of the system (16) is not singular for every $n \in \mathbb{N}$, i.e., for $n=1,2,3, \ldots \operatorname{det} \mathcal{K}_{n} \neq 0$, where

\vdots & \vdots & \ddots & \vdots \\
A_{1} K_{n-1}\left(a_{M}, a_{1}\right) & A_{2} K_{n-1}\left(a_{M}, a_{2}\right) & \cdots & 1+A_{M} K_{n-1}\left(a_{M}, a_{M}\right)
\end{array}\right| .

Remark 2. Let us point out here that for finite sequences of orthogonal polynomials $\left(p_{n}\right)_{n=0}^{N}$, as the case of $q$-Racah polynomials, the conditions of the above proposition should be changed by $\operatorname{det} \mathcal{K}_{n} \neq 0, n=1,2, \ldots, N$.

If we multiply (13) by $\phi(s)=\prod_{i=1}^{M}\left(x(s)-x\left(a_{i}\right)\right)$, and use the ChristoffelDarboux formula (8), then we obtain the following general representation formula

where $A(s ; n)$ and $B(s ; n)$ are polynomials in $x(s)$ of degree bounded by a number independent of $n$ and at most $M$ and $M-1$, respectively, given by formulas

& A(s ; n)=\phi(s)-\frac{\alpha_{n-1}}{d_{n-1}^{2}} \sum_{i=1}^{M} A_{i} \widetilde{P}_{n}\left(a_{i}\right)_{q} P_{n-1}\left(a_{i}\right)_{q} \phi_{i}(s),  \tag{18}\\
& B(s ; n)=\frac{\alpha_{n-1}}{d_{n-1}^{2}} \sum_{i=1}^{M} A_{i} \widetilde{P}_{n}\left(a_{i}\right)_{q} P_{n}\left(a_{i}\right)_{q} \phi_{i}(s)
\end{align*}
$$

where $\phi_{i}(s):=\frac{\phi(s)}{x(s)-x\left(a_{i}\right)}=\prod_{k=1, k \neq i}^{M}\left(x(s)-x\left(a_{k}\right)\right)$.
From the above formula (17) and the expression (7) the following useful representation follows

where

a(s ; n)=A(s ; n)+B(s ; n) \Theta(s ; n), \quad b(s ; n)=B(s ; n) \Xi(s ; n)
$$

Since the family $\left(\widetilde{P}_{n}\right)_{n}$ is orthogonal with respect to a linear functional, they satisfy a TTRR

x(s) \widetilde{P}_{n}(s)_{q}=\widetilde{\alpha}_{n} \widetilde{P}_{n+1}(s)_{q}+\widetilde{\beta}_{n} \widetilde{P}_{n}(s)_{q}+\widetilde{\gamma}_{n} \widetilde{P}_{n-1}(s)_{q}, \quad n \in \mathbb{N} \tag{20}
\end{equation*}
$$

with the initial conditions $\widetilde{P}_{-1}(s)_{q}=0, \widetilde{P}_{0}(s)_{q}=1$. The values of the coefficients can be computed as usual (see e.g. [16, 29])

& \widetilde{\alpha}_{n}=\alpha_{n}=1, \quad \widetilde{\gamma}_{n}=\alpha_{n-1} \frac{\left\langle\tilde{\mathfrak{u}}, \widetilde{P}_{n}^{2}(x)\right\rangle}{\left\langle\widetilde{\mathfrak{u}}, \widetilde{P}_{n-1}^{2}(x)\right\rangle}=\gamma_{n} \frac{1+\Delta_{n}^{A_{1}, A_{2}, \ldots, A_{M}}}{1+\Delta_{n-1}^{A_{1}, A_{2}, \ldots, A_{M}}} \\
& \widetilde{\beta}_{n}=\widetilde{b}_{n}-\widetilde{b}_{n+1}=\beta_{n}-\sum_{i=1}^{M}\left(\frac{1}{d_{n-1}^{2}} A_{i} \widetilde{P}_{n}\left(a_{i}\right)_{q} P_{n-1}\left(a_{i}\right)_{q}-\frac{1}{d_{n}^{2}} A_{i} \widetilde{P}_{n+1}\left(a_{i}\right)_{q} P_{n}\left(a_{i}\right)_{q}\right), \tag{21}
\end{align*}

being $\widetilde{b}_{n}$ the coefficient given in (15), and

\Delta_{n}^{A_{1}, A_{2}, \ldots, A_{M}}=\sum_{i=1}^{M} A_{i} \frac{\widetilde{P}_{n}\left(a_{i}\right)_{q} P_{n}\left(a_{i}\right)_{q}}{d_{n}^{2}}

To conclude this section let us prove the following proposition that is interesting by its own right and constitutes an extension of Theorem 2.1 in [9] to the polynomials on general non-uniform lattices.

Proposition 3. Suppose that the polynomials $\left(\widetilde{P}_{n}\right)_{n}$ satisfy the relation

\pi(s, n) \widetilde{P}_{n}(s)_{q}=a(s, n) P_{n}(s)_{q}+b(s, n) P_{n}(s+1)_{q}, \tag{22}
\end{equation*}
$$

where the polynomial $P_{n}$ is a solution of a second order linear difference equation (SODE) of the form (2). Then, the family $\left(\widetilde{P}_{n}\right)_{n}$ satisfies a SODE of the form

\begin{equation*}
\widetilde{\sigma}(s, n) \frac{\Delta}{\Delta x\left(s-\frac{1}{2}\right)} \frac{\nabla \widetilde{P}_{n}(s)_{q}}{\nabla x(s)}+\widetilde{\tau}(s, n) \frac{\Delta \widetilde{P}_{n}(s)_{q}}{\Delta x(s)}+\widetilde{\lambda}(s, n) \widetilde{P}_{n}(s)_{q}=0 \tag{23}
\end{equation*}
$$

where $\widetilde{\sigma}, \widetilde{\tau}$ and $\widetilde{\lambda}(s, n)$ are defined in (28).
Proof: The proof is similar to the proof of Theorem 2.1 in [1]. First we change $s$ by $s+1$ in (22) and use (2) to eliminate $P_{n}(s+2)_{q}$. This yields

\end{equation*}

where $u(s, n)=A_{s+1} \pi(s+1, n), c(s, n)=-C_{s+1} b(s+1, n)$, and $d(s, n)=$ $A_{s+1} a(s+1, n)-b(s+1, n)\left(\lambda_{n}+B_{s+1}\right)$. Next we change $s$ by $s-1$ in (22) and use (2) to eliminate $P_{n}(s-2)_{q}$, thus

v(s, n) \widetilde{P}_{n}(s-1)_{q}=e(s, n) P_{n}(s)_{q}+f(s, n) P_{n}(s+1)_{q} \tag{25}
\end{equation*}
$$

where $v(s, n)=C_{s} \pi(s-1, n), e(s, n)=C_{s} b(s-1, n)-a(s-1, n)\left(\lambda_{n}+B_{s}\right)$, and $f(s, n)=-A_{s} a(s-1, n)$. Then (22), (24) and (25) yield to

\end{array}\right|=0 .
$$

Expanding the determinant (26) by the first column, we get

& \widetilde{\phi}(s, n) \widetilde{P}_{n}(s-1)_{q}+\widetilde{\varphi}(s, n) \widetilde{P}_{n}(s)_{q}+\widetilde{\xi}(s, n) \widetilde{P}_{n}(s+1)_{q}=0, \\
& \widetilde{\phi}(s, n)=v(s, n)[a(s, n) d(s, n)-b(s, n) c(s, n)], \\
& \widetilde{\varphi}(s, n)=\pi(s, n)[c(s, n) f(s, n)-d(s, n) e(s, n)],  \tag{27}\\
& \widetilde{\xi}(s, n)=u(s, n)[b(s, n) e(s, n)-a(s, n) f(s, n)] .
\end{align*}
$$

Notice that formula (27) can be rewritten in the form (23) with coefficients

& \widetilde{\sigma}(s, n)=\nabla x(s) \Delta x\left(s-\frac{1}{2}\right) \widetilde{\phi}(s, n) \\
& \widetilde{\tau}(s, n)=\Delta x(s) \widetilde{\xi}(s, n)-\nabla x(s) \widetilde{\phi}(s, n)  \tag{28}\\
& \widetilde{\lambda}(s, n)=\widetilde{\xi}(s, n)+\widetilde{\phi}(s, n)+\widetilde{\varphi}(s, n)
\end{align*}

Notice that from (19) and the above proposition it follows that the modified polynomials $\widetilde{P}_{n}(s)_{q}$ satisfies a second order difference equation of type (22) where $\pi(s, n)=\phi(s)$ is independent of $n$.

### 3.1. Two particular examples

Let consider now the cases when we add two mass points. Let $\widetilde{\mathfrak{u}}$ be given by $\widetilde{\mathfrak{u}}=u+A \delta(x(s)-x(a))+B \delta(x(s)-x(b)), a \neq b$. Then, the representation formula (13) yields

\end{equation*}
$$

and the system (16) becomes

\widetilde{P}_{n}^{A, B}(a)_{q} & =P_{n}(a)_{q}-A \widetilde{P}_{n}^{A, B}(a)_{q} \mathrm{~K}_{n-1}(a, a)-B \widetilde{P}_{n}^{A, B}(b)_{q} \mathrm{~K}_{n-1}(a, b), \\
\widetilde{P}_{n}^{A, B}(b)_{q} & =P_{n}(b)_{q}-A \widetilde{P}_{n}^{A, B}(a)_{q} \mathrm{~K}_{n-1}(b, a)-B \widetilde{P}_{n}^{A, B}(b)_{q} \mathrm{~K}_{n-1}(b, b),
\end{aligned}
$$

whose solution is

$$
\binom{\widetilde{P}_{n}^{A, B}(a)_{q}}{\widetilde{P}_{n}^{A, B}(b)_{q}}=\left(\begin{array}{cc}
1+A \mathrm{~K}_{n-1}(a, a) & B \mathrm{~K}_{n-1}(a, b) \\
A \mathrm{~K}_{n-1}(b, a) & 1+B \mathrm{~K}_{n-1}(b, b)
\end{array}\right)^{-1}\binom{P_{n}(a)_{q}}{P_{n}(b)_{q}} .
$$

Notice that $\forall A, B>0$ and $a \neq b$,

$$
\kappa_{n-1}(a, b):=\operatorname{det}\left|\begin{array}{cc}
1+A \mathrm{~K}_{n-1}(a, a) & B \mathrm{~K}_{n-1}(a, b)  \tag{30}\\
A \mathrm{~K}_{n-1}(b, a) & 1+B \mathrm{~K}_{n-1}(b, b)
\end{array}\right|>0
$$

Thus, from Proposition 1 the polynomials $\widetilde{P}_{n}^{A, B}(s)_{q}$ are well defined for all values $A, B>0$. Furthermore, for the values $\widetilde{P}_{n}^{A, B}(a)_{q}$ and $\widetilde{P}_{n}^{A, B}(b)_{q}$ we obtain the expressions

\widetilde{P}_{n}^{A, B}(a)_{q} & =\frac{\left(1+B \mathrm{~K}_{n-1}(b, b)\right) P_{n}(a)_{q}-B \mathrm{~K}_{n-1}(a, b) P_{n}(b)_{q}}{\kappa_{n-1}(a, b)},  \tag{31}\\
\widetilde{P}_{n}^{A, B}(b)_{q} & =\frac{\left(1+A \mathrm{~K}_{n-1}(a, a)\right) P_{n}(b)_{q}-A \mathrm{~K}_{n-1}(b, a) P_{n}(a)_{q}}{\kappa_{n-1}(a, b)},
\end{align*}
$$

where $\kappa_{n-1}(a, b)$ is given in (30). For this case formula (14) becomes

\widetilde{d}_{n}^{2}=\left\langle\widetilde{\mathfrak{u}}, \widetilde{P}_{n}^{2}(x)\right\rangle=d_{n}^{2}+A \widetilde{P}_{n}^{A, B}(a)_{q} P_{n}(a)_{q}+B \widetilde{P}_{n}^{A, B}(b)_{q} P_{n}(b)_{q} . \tag{32}
\end{equation*}
$$

Remark 4. If $A, B$ are in general complex numbers then, according to Proposition 1, in order that there exists a sequence of orthogonal polynomials $\left(\widetilde{P}_{n}^{A, B}(s)_{q}\right)_{n}$ the condition $\kappa_{n-1}(a, b) \neq 0$, where $\kappa_{n-1}(a, b)$ is defined in (30), should be hold for all $n \in \mathbb{N}, A, B \in \mathbb{C}$.

From formula (29) the representation formulas (17) and (19) follow. Moreover, using the expression (21) we obtain the following expressions for the coefficients of the TTRR (20)

& -B\left(\frac{\widetilde{P}_{n}^{A, B}(b)_{q} P_{n-1}(b)_{q}}{d_{n-1}^{2}}-\frac{\widetilde{P}_{n+1}^{A, B}(b)_{q} P_{n}(b)_{q}}{d_{n}^{2}}\right),  \tag{33}\\
\widetilde{\gamma}_{n}= & \gamma_{n} \frac{1+\Delta_{n}^{A, B}}{1+\Delta_{n-1}^{A, B}}, \quad \Delta_{n}^{A, B}=\frac{A \widetilde{P}_{n}^{A, B}(a)_{q} P_{n}(a)_{q}}{d_{n}^{2}}+\frac{B \widetilde{P}_{n}^{A, B}(b)_{q} P_{n}(b)_{q}}{d_{n}^{2}} .
\end{align*}
$$

Putting $B=0$ in all the above formulas we recover the case of one mass point, namely

\begin{gather*}
\widetilde{d}_{n}^{2}=\left\langle\widetilde{\mathfrak{u}}, \widetilde{P}_{n}^{2}(x)\right\rangle=d_{n}^{2}+A \widetilde{P}_{n}^{A}(a)_{q} P_{n}(a)_{q}, \\
\widetilde{\alpha}_{n}=1, \quad \widetilde{\beta}_{n}=\beta_{n}-A\left(\frac{\widetilde{P}_{n}^{A}(a)_{q} P_{n-1}(a)_{q}}{d_{n-1}^{2}}-\frac{\widetilde{P}_{n+1}^{A}(a)_{q} P_{n}(a)_{q}}{d_{n}^{2}}\right),  \tag{34}\\
\widetilde{\gamma}_{n}=\gamma_{n} \frac{1+\Delta_{n}^{A}}{1+\Delta_{n-1}^{A}}, \quad \Delta_{n}^{A}=\frac{A \widetilde{P}_{n}^{A}(a)_{q} P_{n}(a)_{q}}{d_{n}^{2}} .
\end{gather*}
$$

Notice that since in both cases we have the representation formula (19), it follows from Proposition 3 that the Krall-type polynomials on the general non-uniform lattices $\widetilde{P}_{n}^{A, B}(s)_{q}$ and $\widetilde{P}_{n}^{A}(s)_{q}$ considered here satisfy a SODE (23) (or (27)) whose coefficients are given by (28).

## 4. Examples of Krall-type polynomials on the $q$-quadratic lattice

In this section we present some examples of families of the Krall-type polynomials on the lattice $x(s)=c_{1} q^{s}+c_{2} q^{-s}+c_{3}$. More exactly we start from the family of non-standard $q$-Racah defined on the $q$-quadratic lattice $x(s)=$ $[s]_{q}[s+1]_{q}$ by the following basic series (for the definition and properties of basic series see [17]) where $b-a \in \mathbb{N}$

$$
\begin{align*}
u_{n}^{\alpha, \beta}(s)_{q}:=u_{n}^{\alpha, \beta}(x(s), a, b)_{q} & =\frac{q^{-\frac{n}{2}(2 a+1)}\left(q^{a-b+1} ; q\right)_{n}\left(q^{\beta+1} ; q\right)_{n}\left(q^{a+b+\alpha+1} ; q\right)_{n}}{\left(q^{\frac{1}{2}}-q^{-\frac{1}{2}}\right)^{2 n}\left(q^{\alpha+\beta+n+1} ; q\right)_{n}} \\
& \times{ }_{4} \varphi_{3}\left(\left.\begin{array}{c}
q^{-n}, q^{\alpha+\beta+n+1}, q^{a-s}, q^{a+s+1} \\
q^{a-b+1}, q^{\beta+1}, q^{a+b+\alpha+1}
\end{array} \right\rvert\, q, q\right) \tag{35}
\end{align*}
$$

and modified their corresponding linear functional by adding two delta Dirac functionals.

We use the above non-standard family, introduced in [29] and studied in detail in $[2,11]$, instead of the standard $q$-Racah polynomials introduced by Askey and Wilson [12], $R_{n}\left(x(s) ; \alpha, \beta, q^{-N-1}, \delta \mid q\right)$, since, contrary to the standard Racah polynomials, that are defined on the lattice $x(s)=q^{-s}+\delta q^{-N} q^{s}$ (see [12] or the more recent book [24, page 422]), they are polynomials on a lattice that does not depend on the parameters of the polynomials. Nevertheless, let also mention that from (35) it follows that the polynomials $u_{n}^{\alpha, \beta}(s)_{q}$ are multiples of the standard $q$-Racah polynomials $R_{n}\left(x(s-a) ; q^{\beta}, q^{\alpha}, q^{a-b}, q^{a+b} \mid q\right), b-a=N$ (see [11] for more details).

We also consider here the non-standard dual $q$-Hahn polynomials defined by [10], $b-a \in \mathbb{N}$

Let us point out also that the above polynomials are different from the standard dual $q$-Hahn introduced in [21] since they are also defined on the lattice $x(s)=[s]_{q}[s+1]_{q}$ that does not depend on the parameters of the polynomials
(see also [24, page 450]). Notice also that if we put $\beta=a+c$, and take the limit $q^{\alpha} \rightarrow 0$ the non-standard $q$-Racah polynomials (35) becomes into (36). Therefore, we concentrate on the modifications of the non-standard $q$-Racah polynomials and we will obtain the properties of the Krall-type dual $q$-Hahn polynomials by taking appropriate limits.

### 4.1. Modification of non-standard $q$-Racah polynomials

In this section we consider the modification of the non-standard $q$-Racah polynomials defined in (35) by adding two mass points, i.e., the polynomials orthogonal with respect to the functional $\widetilde{\mathfrak{u}}=u+A \delta(x(s)-x(a))+B \delta(x(s)-$ $x(b-1)$ ), where $\mathfrak{u}$ is defined in (3). In other words, we study the polynomials $u_{n}^{\alpha, \beta, A, B}(s)_{q}:=u_{n}^{\alpha, \beta, A, B}(x(s), a, b)_{q}$ that satisfy the following orthogonality relation

Representation of $u_{n}^{\alpha, \beta, A, B}(s)_{q}$ in terms of basic series
In this section, we obtain some explicit formulas for the $u_{n}^{\alpha, \beta, A, B}(s, a, b)_{q}$ polynomials in terms of basic hypergeometric series. To obtain the first representation formula in terms of basic series of $u_{n}^{\alpha, \beta, A, B}(s, a, b)_{q}$, we rewrite (46) by using the identity [11]

Remark 5. Notice that from (41) it is easy to see that $u_{n}^{\alpha, \beta, A, B}(s)_{q}$ is a polynomial of degree $n$ in $x(s)$, whereas from (51) it is not. This is beacuse $D_{n}^{\alpha, \beta, \alpha_{1,2,3,4}}(s)$ and the parameters $q^{\alpha_{1}}, q^{\alpha_{2}}, q^{\alpha_{3}}$, and $q^{\alpha_{4}}$, that appear in the formula (51) depend, in general, on s. A similar situation happens with the representation as a sum of four basic series.

Let us obtain a more convenient representation in terms of the basic series. For doing that we use (48). In fact, substituting (35) into (48) we obtain

Remark 6. Notice that the left hand side of (53) $\phi(s) u_{n}^{\alpha, \beta, A, B}(s)_{q}$ is a polynomial of degree $n+2$ in $x(s)$ (this follows from (48) and (18)). To see that formula (53) gives a polynomial of degree $n+2$ it is sufficient to notice that the function $\Pi_{1}$ defined in (52) is a polynomial in $x(s)$, which follows from that fact that $A(s, n)$ and $B(s, n)$ are polynomial of degree 2 and 1 in $x(s)$, respectively (see (18)).

It follows from the above remark that, contrary to the formula (51), the representation (53) is a very convenient way of writing the polynomials

In this section we consider the case of non-standard $q$-Racah polynomials but with one mass point at the value $s=a$. All the formulas follow from the ones in section 4.1 just putting $B=0$, then we include only the final results.

### 4.2. Some limit cases

We start with the modification of dual $q$-Hahn polynomials defined in (36) by adding two mass points at the end of the interval of orthogonality. I.e., the polynomials $w_{n}^{c, A, B}(s)_{q}:=w_{n}^{c, A, B}(x(s), a, b)_{q}$ satisfying the orthogonality relation

$\mathrm{K}_{m}^{c}(s, t)=\sum_{k=0}^{m} w_{k}^{c}(s)_{q} w_{k}^{c}(t)_{q} / d_{k}^{2}$, and $d_{n}^{2}$ denotes the norm of the dual $q$ Hahn polynomials.

Notice that if we make the change $\beta=a+c$ in the orthogonality relation for the non-standard $q$-Racah polynomials (38), take the limit $q^{\alpha} \rightarrow 0$, and use that $\lim _{q^{\alpha} \rightarrow 0} u_{n}^{\alpha, a+c}(s)_{q}=w_{n}^{c}(s)_{q}$, we obtain the orthogonality relation (57), and therefore, it is straightforward to see that

Thus, all properties of the modified dual $q$-Hahn polynomials $w_{n}^{c, A, B}(s)_{q}$ can be obtained from the corresponding properties of the modified $q$-Racah polynomials $u_{n}^{\alpha, \beta, A, B}(s)_{q}$ by taking the appropriate limit. For this reason we will only include here the TTRR for the $w_{n}^{c, A, B}(s)_{q}$

where we use the notation defined in (58) and (59).
To conclude this paper we consider two important limit cases of the $q$ -Racah-Krall polynomials $u_{n}^{\alpha, \beta, A, B}(s)_{q}$.

The first one is when we take the limit $q \rightarrow 1$. In fact, if we take the limit $q \rightarrow 1$ in (35) we recover the non-standard Racah polynomials in the quadratic lattice $x(s)=s(s+1)$ [11, 29] (notice that they are different from the standard Racah polynomials [24, page 190]), i.e.,

Straightforward calculations show that all the properties of the non-standard $q$-Racah polynomials $u_{n}^{\alpha, \beta}(s)_{q}$ becomes into the properties of the non-standard Racah ones (see e.g. [10]). Thus, we have the following limit relation

where $u_{n}^{\alpha, \beta, A, B}(s(s+1), a, b)$ denotes the modification of the non-standard Racah polynomials by adding two delta Dirac masses at the points $a$ and $b-1$.

Moreover, from the corresponding formulas of the $q$-Racah-Krall polynomials $u_{n}^{\alpha, \beta, A, B}(s)_{q}$ we can obtain the main properties of the Racah-Krall (not $q)$ polynomials $u_{n}^{\alpha, \beta, A, B}(s)$. Thus, taking appropriate limits one can construct the analogue of the Askey Tableau but for the Krall type polynomials (not $q$ ).

Another important family of Krall-type polynomials are the so called $q$ -Hahn-Krall tableau of orthogonal polynomials considered in [5, 9]. Let us show how we can obtain it from our case.

First of all notice that the non-standard $q$-Racah polynomials are defined on the lattice $x(s)=[s]_{q}[s+1]_{q}$ which is of the form (1) with $c_{1}=$ $q^{1 / 2}\left(q^{1 / 2}-q^{-1 / 2}\right)^{-2}, c_{3}=-q^{1 / 2}+q^{-1 / 2}\left(q^{1 / 2}-q^{-1 / 2}\right)^{-2}, \zeta=1$. Then, making the transformation $x(s) \rightarrow q^{-a-1} c_{1} x(s), q^{\alpha}=\mu, q^{\beta}=\gamma, q^{-b}=q^{-N-1-a}$
in (35), taking the limit $q^{a} \rightarrow 0$, and using the identity [2]

The above limit relation allows us to obtain the $q$-Hahn-Krall polynomials. For doing that we use

where $d_{k}$ and $\bar{d}_{k}^{2}$ denote the norms for the non-standard $q$-Racah and the $q$-Hahn polynomials, respectively. Then, applying the aforesaid transformation to (8) we obtain the following limit relation for the kernels of the non-standard $q$-Racah and $q$-Hahn polynomials

From the limit relations (60), (62), and (63) and using (41) we obtain that

where $C_{n}$ is given in (61). I.e., we obtain the $q$-Hahn-Krall polynomials on the lattice $x(s)=q^{-s}$ which satisfy the orthogonality relation

where $\rho$ is the weight function of the $q$-Hahn polynomials (see [24, page 445]).

## 5. Concluding remarks

In the present work we have developed a method for constructing the Krall-type polynomials on the $q$-quadratic non-uniform lattices, i.e., lattices of the form $x(s)=c_{1} q^{s}+c_{2} q^{s}+c_{3}$. As a representative example the modification of the non-standard $q$-Racah polynomials was considered in detail. This is an important example for two reasons: 1) it is the first family of the Kralltype polynomials on a non-linear type lattice that has been studied in detail and 2) almost all modifications (via the addition of delta Dirac masses) of the classical and $q$-classical polynomials can be obtained from them by taking appropriate limits (as it is shown for the dual $q$-Hahn, the Racah, and the $q$ Hahn polynomials in section 4.2). Let us also mention here that an instance of the Krall-type polynomials obtained from the Askey-Wilson polynomials (with a certain choice of parameters), by adding two mass points at the end of the orthogonality has been mentioned in [20, §6, page 330]. This Askey-Wilson-Krall-type polynomials solve the so-called bi-spectral problem associated with the Askey-Wilson operator. Then, it is an interesting open problem to study the general Krall-type Askey-Wilson polynomials and to obtain their main properties. This will be considered in a forthcoming paper.
